History

The facilities opened in 1976 with the donation of land by Lolita C. Waterman. The subsequent purchase of a former church building on the adjacent property offers 92 acres as a nature preserve.

This private, non-profit community nature center provides environmental education and outdoor recreational opportunities for people of all ages

and interests. This property houses a natural history museum, auditorium, classrooms, a reference library, nature gift shop, and offices.

As a private, non-profit nature center, we raise all

our own operating expenses. These funds come from a variety of sources including memberships, program fees, donations, fundraising events, sales in our Nature Shop and special program-related grants.



Properties

All Waterman Center properties are open to the public free of charge on a year-round basis.

Hilton Road Interpretive Site
Located on a hillside overlooking the
Susquehanna River Valley, this 92 acre refuge is
our primary site. Four miles of trails wind their
way around open woodlands, meadows, a small
stream and a gorge. The museum



houses numerous exhibits and interactive displays. Directions: From Rt. 17, take exit 66 to Rt. 434 west. Travel 1.5 miles and turn left onto Hilton Road.

Brick Pond Wetland Preserve

Located on East Front Street in Owego, the pond comprises 30 acres of open water, emergent plants and a wet woods. A trail, including a floating pontoon bridge, leads visitors around the pond. An active beaver colony is easily visible from the trails. Brick Pond is known as one of the best birding sites in New York State. Directions: From Rt. 17, take exit 65 to 17c West toward Owego for approximately t mile. Turn right onto East Front Street. A parking area is a few blocks on the right.

Apalachin Marsh

The marsh is home to many species of waterfowl, songbirds and mammals as well as trees and shrubs. Directions: Located

1/2 mile west of Hilton Road. Park on north side of Rt. 434 and walk through opening in fence under Rt. 17.

Hiawatha Island and Riverfront Park

This 112 acre island rests in the Susquehanna River between Owego and

Apalachin. It is home to hundreds of flora and fauna species, including several on the State's endangered species list. The island has a rich history and remants of a hotel and farm buildings are visible. A pontoon boat provides access from the mainland to the island for special events and tours. Directions: From Rt. 17, take exit 66 and follow directions to Rt. 434 west. Take Rt. 434 for about 3.5 miles. Turn right on the west end of Marshland Road and take the third driveway on the left.

The IBM Glen - An Educational Preserve
The IBM Glen contains over 118 bird species, stands
of white pine over 100 years old and cedar trees
over 300 years old. Includes four miles of paved
hiking trails and bridges. A waterfall is located at
the southern end of the Glen. An excellent location
for field trips in ornithology, environmental science
and biology. Directions: Take Exit 70N to Harry L.
Drive off Rt. 17. Go west on Harry L. Drive 1.9 miles
(left turn). Turn right onto Country Club Road and
then right onto Robinson Hill Road. Glen is on the
right.
